Introduction

In 2013, Grays Harbor County Public Health and Social Services Department received multi-year funding from Washington State Department of Social and Health Services' Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery to help the community of Hoquiam develop a plan to reduce underage alcohol use and its resulting consequences.

The My TOWN Coalition was formed to guide the planning process. My TOWN members include representatives from:

- Hoquiam businesses
- YMCA of Grays Harbor

- National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI)

- substance abuse treatment professionals
- parents and other interested citizens

In September 2014, the My TOWN Coalition asked community residents aged 18 or older to complete a survey about youth substance use. The information collected by the survey is summarized in this report and will be used by the My TOWN Coalition to inform the strategies and priorities of their plan.

Methods

Survey instrument

The survey instrument was developed by Washington State Department of Social and Health Services' Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery. It consists of 31 questions related to demographics, opinions about youth substance use, knowledge about marijuana, and parenting practices. A copy of the survey instrument is in Appendix A.

Survey distribution

Copies of the survey were made available in English at Hoquiam High School's first home football game as well as at back-to-school open houses at Lincoln Elementary, Central Elementary, Hoquiam Middle and Hoquiam High schools during the month of September. Coalition members and partners also staffed a booth at the Logger's Playday street fair in Hoquiam on September 6.

An online version of the survey in both English and Spanish was also made available. Local partners, including Grays Harbor Radio and GraysHarborTalk.com, posted a link to the survey on their websites. Coalition members were asked to email the link out to their Hoquiam contacts.

To increase responses from Hispanic community members, Hoquiam High School staff mailed Spanish-version surveys to all households identified as Spanish-speaking in their district database.

Residents were able to complete the survey during the time period of September 1 – September 30.

Data analysis

Data were compiled by Washington State Department of Social and Health Services' Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery using SurveyMonkey software.

Results

415 residents completed the survey.

Demographics

Age of respondent

11% of respondents were 18-24 years old, 35% were 25-44 years old, and 53% were 45+ years old.

Age of respondent's children

38% of respondents had at least one child in grades 6 - 12.

Gender

70% of respondents were female; 30% were male.

Race/ethnicity

92% of respondents were white/Caucasian, 9% were Native American/Alaska Native. 6% were Hispanic or Latino.

Education

41% of respondents had a college or graduate degree, 33% had completed some college, 22% had completed high school, and 3% had not completed high school.

Opinions about youth substance use

Seriousness of issues

Most respondents felt that youth substance use and youth mental health issues were a moderate to serious problem in the community.

Ease of access to alcohol and marijuana

82% of respondents felt that if a youth wanted to get some alcohol, it would be easy. 84% felt that if a youth wanted to get some marijuana, it would be easy.

Law enforcement

54% of respondents agreed that law enforcement personnel are effective in their response to calls and requests about underage alcohol and drug use at parties or gatherings.

Legal consequences for youth that use alcohol or marijuana

Most respondents thought that youth should receive legal consequences if they use alcohol or marijuana.

Legal consequences for adults that provide alcohol or marijuana to underage youth

Most respondents thought that adults should receive legal consequences if they provide alcohol or marijuana to underage youth.

Perceptions of risk and harm

94% of respondents believe there is at least a moderate risk of people harming themselves and others when they drive under the influence of alcohol and 87% believed there is at least a moderate risk of people harming themselves and others when they drive under the influence of marijuana.

84% of respondents believe there is at least a moderate risk of youth harming themselves physically and in other ways when they use marijuana once or twice a week.

Knowledge and opinions about marijuana

Respondents were asked to share their knowledge and opinions about a variety of issues related to marijuana and the legislation making recreational use of marijuana legal for adults 21+ years old in Washington state.

Prescription drugs

Respondents were asked about how they manage their family’s prescription drugs. 72% said that they always monitor prescription drugs that youth might misuse such as pain killers, anti-depressants, drugs for hyperactivity and sleeping pills. 40% said they don’t always know where they can get rid of prescription drugs that they no longer need.

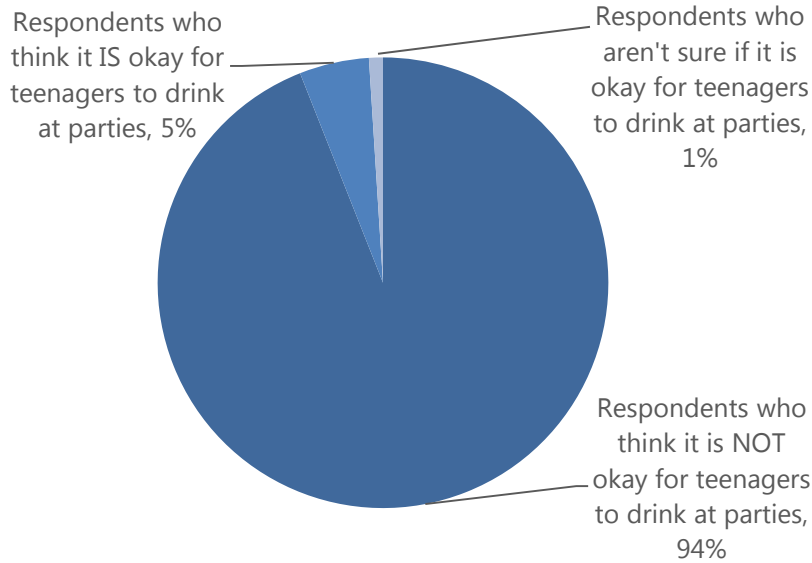
Parenting practices and opinions

Allowing youth to drink alcohol, use marijuana or use prescription drugs not prescribed to them

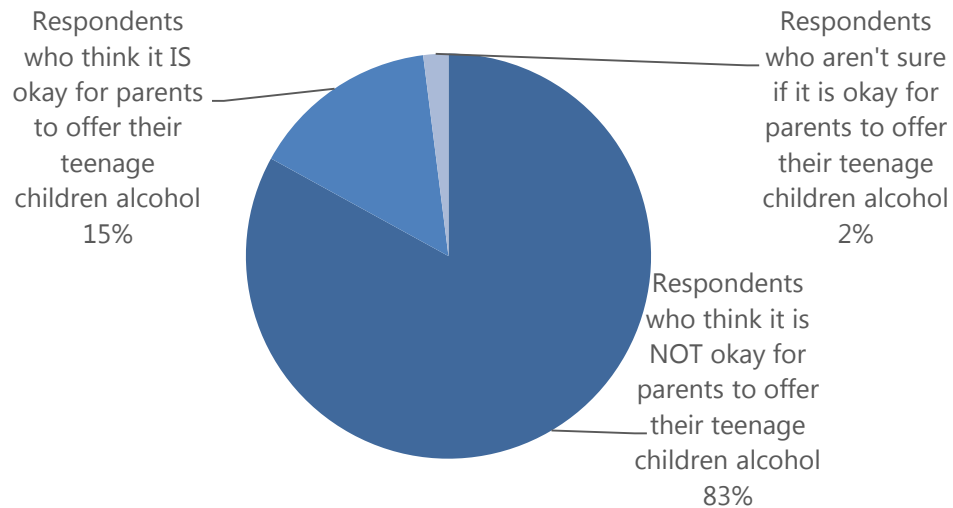
Almost all respondents think it is wrong or very wrong for youth in grades 6-12 to drink alcohol, use marijuana or use prescription drugs not prescribed to them.

33% of respondents said they do not keep ANY alcohol in their home and another 61% said they NEVER allow youth to drink alcohol in their home. 1% said they allow youth to drink alcohol in their home on special occasions. Another 3% said they allow their own children to drink alcohol in their home, but not their children’s friends. 1% said they allow youth to drink alcohol in their home only under supervision. 0% said they allow youth to drink alcohol in their home without any restrictions.

94% believe it is NEVER okay for teenagers to drink at parties.



83% believe it is NEVER okay for parents to offer their teenaged children alcoholic drinks in their home.



Although most respondents have a strict stance AGAINST underage drinking, 45% of respondents thought that most adults in the community feel it is okay for parents to offer their teenage children alcoholic drinks in their own home at least on special occasions.

63% of respondents said they do not keep ANY marijuana in their home and another 35% said they NEVER allow youth to use marijuana in their home. 0% said they allow

youth to use marijuana in their home on special occasions and 0% said they allow their own children to use marijuana in their home, but not their children's friends. 0% said they allow youth to use marijuana in their home only under supervision. 1% said they allow youth to use marijuana in their home without any restrictions.

Talking to their children about alcohol and marijuana

Of respondents with children in grades 6-12, 88% have talked with their children about the potential negative consequences of alcohol use in the last three months, 83% have talked about the potential negative consequences of marijuana use in the last three months and 67% have talked about the potential negative consequences of using prescription drugs that were not prescribed to them in the last three months.

45% of respondents wish they knew better what to say to their child about drugs and 18% thought that what they say will have little influence on whether their child uses drugs. 7% believe that drug education is best handled by the schools, not by parents. 64% believe that there are places in the community where parents can learn more about how to help prevent their children from using drugs.

Monitoring their children

Most respondents with children in grades 6-12 closely monitor their children when they go out in the evenings or on weekends, but they believe that other parents in the community don't monitor their own children as closely.

- 96% of respondents always ask their child who s/he will be with but only 7% think that other parents always ask their child too.
- 96% of respondent always ask their child where they are going but only 6% think that other parents always ask their child too.
- 90% of respondents always check to see if there will be adult supervision but only 6% think that other parents always check too.
- 89% of respondents always set a curfew and 85% always wait up until their child comes home but only 6% think that other parents always do this too.
- 61% of respondents always check their children for signs of substance use when they get home but only 6% think that other parents always check too.

Next steps

The My TOWN Coalition will use the information from the community survey, along with other Hoquiam-specific data, to continue to inform new strategies geared toward reducing underage alcohol (and other drug) use and its resulting consequences as well as to monitor the progress of selected and currently implemented strategies.
